To observe National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (#NWGHAAD), we presented **As We See It: Wisdom and the Unique Experiences of Women Born with HIV** – an interactive, multi-media session led by women who grew up living with HIV. Co-hosted by two fierce advocates and The Well Project Community Advisory Board members, <u>Porchia Dees</u> and <u>Ieshia Scott</u>, the session continues the work and fact sheet they helped to develop on this topic, "<u>Women with Early Acquired HIV</u>". The conversation streamed live on our <u>Facebook page</u> and <u>YouTube channel</u>, reaching thousands and generating a dynamic discussion among viewers.

The event began with a brief presentation by Allison Agwu, MD, which provided some clinical context for a lively, layered, and powerful conversation among women, all of whom were born with HIV. Topics covered included: finding out their HIV status in childhood; sex, dating, and disclosing (or not) to sexual partners; transitioning from pediatric to adult care; impact of U=U; losing parents to complications of AIDS – and so many more areas were touched upon that deserve their own full conversations. Moderators and panelists asked one another questions, acknowledging the similarities of their experiences and gaining insight from the differences.
